DESCRIPTION OF INSTITUTIONS INCLUDED IN THIS LIST.

CERTIFIED REFORMATORIES, under the Reformatory Schools Act (29 and 30 Vict., cap. 117), are for the reception, under sentence by a magistrate, of criminal children under sixteen years of age, *who must have undergone at least ten days' imprisonment previously to their being admitted.*

CERTIFIED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS, under the Industrial Schools Act (29 and 30 Vict., cap. 118), are for the reception, *under the order of a magistrate*, of any child under fourteen, coming within any of the following descriptions, *viz.* :—

Section 14. That is found *begging* or receiving alms (whether actually or under the pretext of selling or offering for sale anything), or being in any street or public place for the purpose of so begging or receiving alms.

That is found *wandering*, and not having any home or settled place of abode or proper guardianship or visible means of subsistence.

That is found *destitute*, either being an orphan or having a surviving parent who is undergoing penal servitude or imprisonment.

That frequents the company of reputed thieves.

That is living with common or reputed prostitutes (43 & 44 Vict. cap. 15; see p. 95).

Section 17. That, being maintained in a workhouse or pauper school, is refractory.

Section 15. Also children under twelve, charged with an offence punishable by imprisonment, but not previously convicted of felony.

Section 16. Such, that his parent, step-parent, or guardian, represents that he is unable to control the child, and desires him to be sent to an Industrial School, under the Act.

HOMES, REFUGES, AND UNCERTIFIED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS, are for the reception of the homeless, neglected, and destitute, either by payment of friends, or entirely free.

HOMES FOR WORKING BOYS are for boys in situations without homes, and they contribute to their own support according to their earnings.

THE TRAINING SHIPS in connection with the Union are of various kinds, —some are *Certified* Reformatories, some *Certified* Industrial Schools, and others are *Voluntary* Refuges. They are for boys physically and otherwise suited for a sea life.

PENITENTIARIES AND HOMES FOR FEMALES receive penitent fallen women.

DISCHARGED PRISONERS' AID SOCIETIES assist prisoners on their discharge from prison.

This CLASSIFIED LIST contains *all the Certified Institutions* that are under the inspection of Government.

Only such Protestant Voluntary Institutions are placed on the List as have applied to be put in connection with the Reformatory and Refuge Union. In placing an Institution on the List of the Union, the Council are guided with reference to *Uncertified Institutions* by the following Resolution, adopted April 7, 1859 :—

"That no Uncertified Institution, supported by or seeking public contributions, be for the future placed on the list of the Union, which has not a Committee responsible in itself, and ready to guarantee the *bonâ fide* character of the Institution."

SUMMARY OF OBJECTS AND WORK.

I. Improvement and Extension of Preventive Efforts.

By collecting and diffusing information as to the operations and results of all such Institutions; affording a means of communication between their promoters, and of concerted action with reference to the Government, the Legislature, and the Public. By facilitating the establishment of new Institutions, the selection and training of efficient Masters, Matrons, and Assistants. By periodically holding important conferences of Managers and Superintendents in different parts of the kingdom, and smaller meetings of a similar nature in the Metropolis.

These various operations are supported out of the *General Fund* of the Union.

II. Aid to those who Feed, Clothe, and Educate the Destitute.

(1.) By Grants to those Refuges, Homes, and Industrial Schools in which the Homeless, Outcast, and Neglected are sheltered and taught. More than 32,000*l.* have been thus distributed since the formation of the Union. No Grant is made by the Union to any Institution until a visit of Inspection has been paid by a Member of the Council, and his report of its management and financial position received and approved.

These Grants are made out of the *Children's Aid & Refuge Fund* of the Union.

(2.) By the maintenance of a *Provident and Benevolent Fund*, established for the benefit of Officers in Institutions connected with the Union when they become incapacitated, through sickness or old age, for further effective service, and for the benefit of the widows and orphans of deceased workers. This *Fund* is supported by the Officers themselves, aided by voluntary contributions and occasional Grants from the Union.

III. Missionary Efforts directed by the Council.

These are (1st) A *Woman's Mission to Women* (The Female Mission to the Fallen), in which Christian Female Missionaries are engaged labouring in the streets of London among the Fallen of their own sex, distributing tracts, giving them kindly advice, and seeking to lead them to a better life. They have rescued more than 13,000 young women, and have procured them admission into Homes, restored them to friends, placed them in service, or otherwise provided for them.

This work is supported by the *Female Mission Fund*.

(2nd) An Agent, known as the *Boys' Beadle*, who is employed to "look after" the waifs and strays found wandering in the great thoroughfares of the Metropolis, or hidden away on the doorsteps, or in the dark corners of its courts and alleys. His duty is to assist Managers by investigating the cases of applicants for admission to the various Schools, and but for his energy and discrimination, many children would never have found their way to the friendly shelter of a home; while on the other hand, many parents who are quite able to support their children would have been relieved of their responsibility at the expense of the public.

(3rd) Two *Rescue Officers*, who watch for evidence of children being used for immoral purposes, and rescue these and others from the haunts of vice and misery; placing them when necessary in Industrial Schools.

(4th) A *Shoeblocks' Beadle*, who in a variety of ways co-operates with the Shoeblock Societies of the Metropolis, preventing absconding, and assisting in finding situations or Homes for boys who have been in the Brigades.

In connection with the Union there is also a *Metropolitan Discharged Prisoners' Relief Committee*, for aiding those who have committed their first or second offence to regain their good name, and to return to the ranks of the industrious and honest.

A special Fund has to be raised to support this work.

The Union co-operates heartily with the Metropolitan Police Magistrates; also with School Boards and other Educational Institutions, by supplementing their work in cases which they are unable to deal with.

This and the employment of the shoeblock is not included in the above list of industries.

ABSTRACT OF THE REFORMATORY SCHOOLS ACT, 1866.

29 & 30 VICT., CAP. 117.

The title is given as "An Act to consolidate and amend the Acts relating to Reformatory Schools in Great Britain."

Section 1 enacts that the Act may be cited as "The Reformatory Schools Act, 1866."

Section 2 excludes Ireland from its operations.*

Section 3 interprets the various terms used.

Section 4 refers to the mode of certifying Reformatory Schools by the Secretary of State, after a visit of inspection by Her Majesty's Inspector of Reformatory Schools. It also enacts, that no substantial addition or alteration shall be made to or in the buildings of any Certified Reformatory School, without the approval in writing of the Secretary of State.

Sections 5 and 6 provide for the annual inspection of each school, and the appointment of assistant-inspector.

Sections 7 to 11 make arrangements for the withdrawal of the certificate by the Secretary of State, or its resignation by the managers, on six months' notice being given by either, and for the consequent removal of the children.

Section 12 compels the managers to submit their rules, and any alterations of them, to the Secretary of State for approval.

Section 13 bestows the privileges of a constable upon officers of a Reformatory conveying an inmate to or from the school.

Section 14. Whenever any offender who, in the judgment of the Court, Justices, or Magistrate before whom he is charged, is under the age of sixteen years, is convicted, on indictment or in a summary manner, of an offence punishable with penal servitude or imprisonment, and is sentenced to be imprisoned for the term of ten days, or a longer term, the Court, Justices, or Magistrate may also sentence him to be sent, at the expiration of his period of imprisonment, to a Certified Reformatory School, and to be there detained for a period of not less than two years and not more than five years.

Provided always, that a youthful offender under the age of ten years shall not be so directed to be sent to a Reformatory School unless he has been previously charged with some crime or offence punishable with penal servitude or imprisonment, or is sentenced in England by a Judge of Assize or Court of General or Quarter Sessions, or in Scotland by a Circuit Court of Justiciary or Sheriff.

The particular school to which the youthful offender is to be sent may be named either at the time of his sentence being passed, or within seven days thereafter, by the Court, Justices, or Magistrate who sentenced him, or in default thereof at any time before the expiration of his imprisonment by any Visiting Justice of the prison to which he is committed.

In choosing a Certified Reformatory School, the Court, Justices, Magistrate, or Visiting Justice shall endeavour to ascertain the religious persuasion to which the youthful offender belongs, and, so far as is possible, a selection shall be made of a school conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the youthful offender appears to the Court, Justices, Magistrate, or Visiting Justice to belong, which persuasion shall be specified by the Court, Justices, Magistrate, or Visiting Justice.

It shall be lawful, upon the representation of the parent, or in the case of an orphan, then of the guardian or nearest adult relative, of any offender detained in any

such school, for a minister of the religious persuasion of such offender, at certain fixed hours of the day, which shall be fixed by the Secretary of State for the purpose, to visit such school for the purpose of affording religious assistance to such offender, and also for the purpose of instructing such offender in the principles of his religion.

Section 15 provides for the removal of the youthful offender from the prison to the Certified Reformatory School.

Section 16 gives power to parent, step-parent, or guardian (or if there be none such, to God-parent or nearest adult relative) to apply to remove offender from a school which is not conducted in accordance with offender's religious persuasion to one that is, provided:—

First, that the application be made before the offender has been sent to a Certified Reformatory School, or within thirty days after his arrival at such a school.

Secondly, that the applicant show to the satisfaction of the Court, Visiting Justices, Justices, or Magistrate that the managers of the school named by him are willing to receive the offender.

Section 17 refers to discharge or removal of inmates by order of Secretary of State.

Section 18 enacts that the managers of a Certified Reformatory School may, at any time after the expiration of eighteen months of the period of detention allotted to a youthful offender, by licence under their hands, permit him to live with any trustworthy and respectable person named in the licence willing to receive and take charge of him. The rest of the clause gives the conditions of these licences.

Section 19 empowers the managers to apprentice a child who has been previously licensed.

Sections 20 and 21 provide for the punishment by imprisonment of those who refuse to conform to the rules of, and escape from, a Reformatory.

Section 22 inflicts a fine of twenty pounds or two months' imprisonment on any person assisting or inducing a child to escape, or harbouring him when escaped.

Section 23 charges expenses of conveyance, and proper clothing requisite for admission, to prison authority.

Section 24 empowers the Treasury to contribute to the support of the children in the schools.

Sections 25 and 26 require that the parent, step-parent, or other person legally liable to maintain any youthful offender detained in a Certified Reformatory School shall, if of sufficient ability, contribute to his support and maintenance therein a sum not exceeding five shillings per week; but by the rest of the clause the Magistrate can only make the order on the complaint of the Inspector, and after the child's admission to the school.

Section 27 empowers prison authorities to contract with managers of schools for the reception of children.

Sections 28 to 30 give power to prison authorities to contribute towards the establishment, enlargement, and expenses of these schools.*

Section 31 places the Scotch Houses of Refuge, &c., erected under local Acts, on the same basis as Reformatories where their managers wish it.

Section 32 gives power to Secretary of State to send youthful offenders sentenced to penal servitude, or imprisonment, to Reformatory Schools on conditional pardon.

Sections 33 to 38 refer to evidence under the Act, and provide for various necessary legal proceedings.

ABSTRACT OF THE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS ACT, 1866,

29 & 30 VICT., CAP. 118.

The title is given as "An Act to Consolidate and Amend the Acts relating to Industrial Schools in Great Britain."

Section 1 enacts that the Act may be cited as "The Industrial Schools Act, 1866."

Section 2 excludes Ireland from its operations.*

Section 3 repeals the Industrial Schools Acts of 1861 and 1862 and the Act for Scotland of 1861.

Section 4 interprets the various terms used.

Section 5. A school in which industrial training is provided, and in which children are lodged, clothed, and fed, as well as taught, shall exclusively be deemed an Industrial School within the meaning of this Act. The persons for the time being having the management or control of such a school shall be deemed the managers thereof for the purposes of this Act.

Sections 6 to 10 refer to the appointment of Inspector and assistant, and provide for the inspection of the school before a certificate can be granted by the Secretary of State, as well as for at least an annual inspection.

Section 8 forbids a school to be certified both under this and the Reformatory Schools Act.

Sections 11 to 13 enact that no substantial addition or alteration shall be made to or in the buildings of any school without the approval in writing of the Secretary of State, to whom the plans are to be submitted; and give power to counties and boroughs to contribute towards the establishment, enlargement, and expenses of these schools.†

Section 14. Any person may bring before two Justices or a Magistrate any child apparently under the age of fourteen years that comes within any of the following descriptions, namely,—

That is found begging or receiving alms (whether actually or under the pretext of selling or offering for sale any thing), or being in any street or public place for the purpose of so begging or receiving alms;

That is found wandering and not having any home or settled place of abode, or proper guardianship, or visible means of subsistence;

That is found destitute, either being an orphan or having a surviving parent who is undergoing penal servitude or imprisonment;

That frequents the company of reputed thieves.

The Justices or Magistrate before whom a child is brought as coming within one of these descriptions, if satisfied on inquiry of that fact, and that it is expedient to deal with him under this Act, may order him to be sent to a Certified Industrial School.

Section 15. Where a child apparently under the age of twelve years is charged before two Justices or a Magistrate with an offence punishable by imprisonment or a less punishment, but has not been in England convicted of felony, or in Scotland of theft, and the child ought, in the opinion of the Justices or Magistrate (regard being had to his age and to the circumstances of the case), to be dealt with under this Act, the Justices or Magistrate may order him to be sent to a Certified Industrial School.

Section 16. Where the parent or step-parent or guardian of a child apparently

under the age of fourteen years represents to two Justices or a Magistrate that he is unable to control the child, and that he desires that the child be sent to an Industrial School under this Act, the Justices or Magistrate, if satisfied on inquiry that it is expedient to deal with the child under this Act, may order him to be sent to a Certified Industrial School.

Section 17. Where the guardians of the poor of a union or of a parish wherein relief is administered by a board of guardians, or the board of management of a district pauper school, or the parochial board of a parish or combination, represent to two Justices or a Magistrate that any child apparently under the age of fourteen years maintained in a workhouse or pauper school of a union or parish, or in a district pauper school, or in the poorhouse of a parish or combination, is refractory, or is the child of parents either of whom has been convicted of a crime or offence punishable with penal servitude or imprisonment, and that it is desirable that he be sent to an Industrial School under this Act, the Justices or Magistrate may, if satisfied that it is expedient to deal with the child under this Act, order him to be sent to a Certified Industrial School.

Sections 18 to 24 refer to the form and contents of the order of detention, the most important proviso enacting that in determining on the school the Magistrates shall endeavour to ascertain the religious persuasion to which the child belongs, and shall, if possible, select a school conducted in accordance with such religious persuasion, and the order shall specify such religious persuasion.

If a child is sent to a school not in accordance with its religious persuasion, power is given to the parent, step-parent, guardian, God-parent, or nearest adult relative, to petition the Magistrate and have it removed to a school that is.

Section 25. A minister of the religious persuasion specified in the order of detention as that to which the child appears to the Justices or Magistrate to belong may visit the child at the school on such days and at such times as are from time to time fixed by regulations made by the Secretary of State for the purpose of instructing him in religion.

Section 26 gives the managers power to permit the child to be lodged out of the school with its parents or others.

Section 27 allows the managers to place the child out on licence after eighteen months of detention.

Section 28 empowers the managers to apprentice a child who has been previously placed out on licence.

Section 29 compels the managers to submit their rules, and any alterations of them, to the Secretary of State for approval.

Sections 30 and 31 refer to evidence of the reception of a child.

Sections 32 and 33 give power to Magistrates to send children above ten, who break the rules of the school or escape from it, to prison, and afterwards to a Reformatory.

Section 34 inflicts a fine of twenty pounds, or two months' imprisonment, on any person assisting or inducing a child to escape, or harbouring him when escaped.

Section 35 empowers the Treasury to contribute to the support of the children in the schools, limiting the amount to two shillings a week for uncontrollable children committed under Clause 16.

Sections 36 to 38 empower various authorities to contract with the schools for the reception of children.

Section 39. The parent, step-parent, or other person for the time being legally liable to maintain a child detained in a Certified Industrial School shall, if of sufficient ability, contribute to his maintenance and training therein a sum not exceeding five shillings per week.

Section 40 says that on the complaint of the Inspector of Industrial Schools, or of any agent of the Inspector, at any time during the detention of a child in a Certified Industrial School, Magistrates having jurisdiction at the place where the parent, step-parent, or other person liable as aforesaid resides may, on summons to the parent, step-parent, or other person liable as aforesaid, examine into his ability to maintain the child, and may, if they think fit, make an order or decree on him for the payment to the Inspector or his agent of such weekly sum, not exceeding five shillings per week, as to

them seems reasonable, during the whole or any part of the time for which the child is liable to be detained in the school.

Section 41 forbids any person over sixteen being detained in an Industrial School, except with his own consent in writing.

Sections 42 and 43 provide for the transfer or discharge of children when necessary.

Sections 44 to 54 make arrangements for the withdrawal of the certificate by the Secretary of State, or its resignation by the managers, on six months' notice being given by either; and for the consequent removal of the children: they also provide for various necessary legal proceedings.

REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS ACTS AMENDMENT ACT, 1872.

35 & 36 VICT., CAP. 21.

The enacting part of this short Act is contained in the following words:—

“Be it enacted that *Section 28* of the ‘Reformatory Schools Act, 1866,’ and *Section 12* of the ‘Industrial Schools Act, 1866,’ shall extend to authorize the prison authority in England themselves to undertake anything towards which they are authorized by those sections to contribute; and the ‘Reformatory Schools Act, 1866,’ and ‘Industrial Schools Act, 1866,’ shall be construed as if in the said sections, so far as it relates to England, the expression ‘contribute towards’ and ‘contribution’ included respectively ‘undertake’ and ‘undertaking’; and the expenses of a prison authority in England incurred in pursuance of these sections shall be defrayed accordingly.”

“A prison authority in England may contribute towards the ultimate disposal of any inmate of a Certified Reformatory School, or Certified Industrial School, established by such authority in pursuance of this part of this Act, and the expenses incurred by a prison authority in England in pursuance of this section shall be deemed to be expenses incurred by such authority in carrying into effect the provisions of the ‘Reformatory Schools Act, 1866,’ or the ‘Industrial Schools Act, 1866.’”

A later clause amends the Elementary Education Act with reference to Certified Industrial Schools and School Boards in boroughs, leaving it optional with a borough prison authority maintaining an Industrial School, whether they will or will not transfer their school to the Board.

THE PREVENTION OF CRIMES ACT, 1871.

34 & 35 VICT., CAP. 112.

Section 14 enacts that, “Where any woman is convicted of a crime, and a previous conviction of a crime is proved against her, any children of such woman under the age of fourteen years who may be under her care and control at the time of her conviction for the last of such crimes, and who have no visible means of subsistence, or are without proper guardianship, shall be deemed to be children to whom in Great Britain the provisions of the ‘Industrial Schools Act, 1866,’ and in Ireland the provisions of the

‘Industrial Schools (Ireland) Act, 1868,’ apply, and the court by whom such woman is convicted, or two justices or a magistrate, shall have the same power of ordering such children to be sent to a Certified Industrial School as is vested in two justices or a magistrate by the fourteenth section of the ‘Industrial Schools Act, 1866,’ and by the eleventh section of the ‘Industrial Schools (Ireland) Act, 1868,’ in respect of the children in the said sections described.”

THE ELEMENTARY EDUCATION ACT, 1870.

33 & 34 VICT., CAP. 75.

Section 27.—“A School Board shall have the same powers of contributing money in the case of an Industrial School as is given to a Prison Authority by *Section 12* of ‘The Industrial Schools Act, 1866’; and upon the election of a School Board in a Borough the Council of that Borough shall cease to have power to contribute under that *Section.*”

Section 28.—“A School Board may, with the consent of the Education Department, establish, build, and maintain a Certified Industrial School within the meaning of ‘The Industrial Schools Act, 1866,’ and shall, for that purpose, have the same powers as they have for the purpose of providing sufficient School accommodation for their district: Provided that the School Board, so far as regards any such Industrial School, shall be subject to the jurisdiction of one of Her Majesty’s Principal Secretaries of State in the same manner as the Managers of any other Industrial School are subject, and such School shall be subject to the provisions of the said Act, and not of this Act.”

By *Section 36*, a School Board may appoint officers to bring children before two Justices, or a Magistrate, in order to their being sent to an Industrial School.

THE NEW ELEMENTARY EDUCATION ACT, 1876.

39 & 40 VICT., CAP. 79.

On Industrial Schools.

Section 11.—“If either,

(1) “The parent of any child above the age of five years who is under this Act prohibited from being taken into full time employment, habitually and without reasonable excuse neglects to provide efficient elementary instruction for his child; or,

(2) “Any child is found habitually wandering or not under proper control, or in the company of rogues, vagabonds, disorderly persons, or reputed criminals, it shall be the duty of the Local Authority, after due warning to the parent of such child, to complain to a court of summary jurisdiction, and such court may, if satisfied of the truth of such complaint, order that the child do attend some certified efficient school willing to receive him and named in the order, being either such as the parent may select, or, if he do not select any, then such Public Elementary School as the court think expedient, and the child shall attend that school every time that the school is open, or in such other regular manner as is specified in the order. An order under this section is in this Act referred to as an attendance order. Any of the following reasons

shall be a reasonable excuse: That there is not within two miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child any public elementary school open which the child can attend; or that the absence of the child from school has been caused by sickness or any unavoidable cause."

Section 12.—"Where an attendance order is not complied with, without any reasonable excuse within the meaning of this Act, a court of summary jurisdiction, on complaint made by the Local Authority, may, if it think fit, order as follows:—

(1) "In the first case of non-compliance, if the parent of the child does not appear, or appears and fails to satisfy the court that he has used all reasonable efforts to enforce compliance with the order, the court may impose a penalty not exceeding with the costs five shillings; but if the parent satisfies the court that he has used all reasonable efforts as aforesaid, the court may, without inflicting a penalty, order the child to be sent to a Certified Day Industrial School, or if it appears to the court that there is no such school suitable for the child, then to a Certified Industrial School; and

(2) "In the second or any subsequent case of non-compliance with the order, the court may order the child to be sent to a Certified Day Industrial School, or if it appears to the court that there is no such school suitable for the child then to a Certified Industrial School, and may further in its discretion inflict any such penalty as aforesaid, or it may for each such non-compliance inflict any such penalty as aforesaid without ordering the child to be sent to an Industrial School; provided that a complaint under this section with respect to a continuing non-compliance with any attendance order shall not be repeated by the Local Authority at any less interval than two weeks. A child shall be sent to a Certified Industrial School or Certified Day Industrial School in pursuance of this section in like manner as if sent in pursuance of the 'Industrial Schools Act, 1866,' and when so sent shall be deemed to have been sent in pursuance of that Act and the Acts amending the same; and the parent, if liable under the said Acts to contribute to the maintenance and training of his child when sent to an Industrial School, shall be liable so to contribute when his child is sent in pursuance of this section."

Section 13.—"Where the Local Authority are informed by any person of any child in their jurisdiction who is stated by that person to be liable to be ordered by a court under this Act to attend school, or to be sent under this Act, or the 'Industrial Schools Act, 1866,' to an Industrial School, it shall be the duty of the Local Authority to take proceedings under this Act or the 'Industrial Schools Act, 1866,' accordingly, unless the Local Authority think that it is inexpedient to take such proceedings. Provided that nothing in this section shall relieve the Local Authority from the responsibility of performing their duty under the other provisions of this Act."

Section 14.—"Where a child is sent to a Certified Industrial School under this Act or the 'Industrial Schools Act, 1866,' upon the complaint or representation of the Local Authority under this Act, the managers of such school may, if they think fit, at any time after the expiration of one month after the child is so sent, give him a licence under section twenty-seven of the 'Industrial Schools Act, 1866,' to live out of the school, but the licence shall be conditional upon the child attending as a day scholar, in such regular manner as is specified in the license, some school willing to receive him and named in the licence, and being a certified efficient school."

Section 15.—"The consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and not of the Education Department, shall be required for the establishing, building, and maintaining of a Certified Industrial or Certified Day Industrial School by a School Board, and to the spreading of the payment of the expense of such establishment and building over a number of years not exceeding fifty, and to the borrowing of money for that purpose; and, for the purpose of such borrowing, section ten of the 'Elementary Education Act, 1873,' shall be held to apply to the loan in like manner as if one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State were substituted therein for the Education Department, and such establishment and building shall be deemed to be a work for which a School Board is authorized to borrow within the meaning of the first schedule to the 'Public Works Loan Act, 1875.'"

On Day Industrial Schools.

By *Section 16* of the "Elementary Education Act, 1876," authority is given to the Secretary of State to Certify a Day Industrial School if he is satisfied that, "owing to the circumstances of any class of population in any school district, a school in which industrial training, elementary education, and one or more meals a day, but not lodging, are provided for the children, is necessary or expedient for the proper training and control of the children of such class."

The same legal power of detention is given to the Managers of Day Industrial Schools, during the hours authorized by the Rules of the School and approved by the Secretary of State, as the Managers of other Certified Industrial Schools have.

"There may be contributed out of moneys provided by Parliament towards the custody, industrial training, elementary education, and meals of children sent by an order of a court other than an Attendance Order under this Act to a Certified Day Industrial School such sums not exceeding one shilling per head per week, and on such conditions as a Secretary of State from time to time recommends."

The Magistrate sending a child to one of these Schools shall "order the parent of such child, if liable to maintain him, to contribute to his industrial training, elementary education, and meals in the School a sum not exceeding two shillings per week to be named in the Order; it shall be the duty of the Local Authority to obtain and enforce the said Order, and every sum paid under the Order shall be paid over to the Local Authority in aid of their expenses under this Act; if a parent resident in any parish is unable to pay the sum ordered to be paid, he shall apply to the Guardians having jurisdiction in the parish, who, if satisfied of such inability, shall give the parent sufficient relief to pay the said sum, or so much thereof as they consider him unable to pay, and the money so given shall be charged to the parish as provided by this Act in the case of money given for the payment of school fees."

"The conditions of a Parliamentary contribution to a Certified Day Industrial School, to be recommended by the Secretary of State, shall provide for the examination of the children according to the standards of proficiency for the time being in force for the purposes of a Parliamentary grant to public Elementary Schools; but may vary the amounts of the contributions to be made in respect of such standards respectively."

Other regulations may be made by Order in Council.

Regulations for Day Industrial Schools.

In pursuance of the "Elementary Education Act, 1876," the Home Secretary has made the following regulations for Day Industrial Schools:—

1. "In the case of a child sent to a Certified Day Industrial School under an Attendance Order, or without an order of court, the sum which his parent shall undertake to pay towards the industrial training, elementary education, and meals of such child shall be such sum as may be agreed upon between the parent of the child and the Managers of the school, not less than one shilling, and not more than two shillings a week.

2. "An attendance at a Certified Day Industrial School shall not count for the purpose of the first schedule of the 'Elementary Education Act, 1876,' unless it comprise three hours of secular instruction."

GLASGOW JUVENILE DELINQUENCY PREVENTION AND REPRESSION ACT, 1878.

41 & 42 VICT., CAP. 121.

Section 30 authorizes the establishment of Certified Day Industrial Schools in the City of Glasgow.

Section 29 gives to the Directors of the Glasgow Houses of Refuge legal power to detain, as inmates of those Institutions, young persons who voluntarily consent to become inmates for a specified period, provided the consent be given in the presence of a Sheriff or other Magistrate, who shall signify his approval of the propriety of the young person's admission to the Refuge.

The Institutions in this Classified List to which this clause refers are numbered 317 and 360.

There are other clauses in this Act which affect all the Glasgow Certified Reformatory and Industrial Schools.

EDUCATION AND MAINTENANCE OF PAUPER CHILDREN ACT, 1862.

25 & 26 VICT., CAP. 43.

Section 1.—"That the Guardians of any parish or union may send any poor child to any school certified as hereinafter mentioned, and supported wholly or partially by voluntary subscriptions, the Managers of which shall be willing to receive such child, and may pay out of the funds in their possession the expenses incurred in the maintenance, clothing, and education of such child therein during the time such child shall remain at such school (not exceeding the total sum which would have been charged for the maintenance of such child if relieved in the workhouse during the same period), and in the conveyance of such child to and from the same, and in the case of death, the expenses of his or her burial."

Section 2.—"The Poor Law Board may, if they think fit, upon the application in writing of the Managers of any such school as aforesaid, appoint such person as they shall deem proper to examine into the condition of the school, and to report to the said Board thereon, and if satisfied with such report, that Board may, by writing under the hand of one of their secretaries, certify that such school is fitted for the reception of such children or persons as may be sent there by the Guardians, in pursuance of this Act; and it shall be lawful for the said Board, if at any time they shall be dissatisfied with the condition or management of such school, by notice addressed to the Managers, and signed as aforesaid, to declare that the certificate is withdrawn from and after a day to be specified therein, not less than two months after the date thereof."

Section 3.—"If the Poor Law Board shall be of opinion that any person is aggrieved by any child being so sent or kept at such school as aforesaid, the Board may order any such child to be removed, and the Guardians shall forthwith cause such child to be removed from the school, and every engagement previously entered into for the payment of the charges of such child shall thereupon cease, and become void for the future."

Section 4.—"Every school wherein any such child shall be received shall be open to the visitation and inspection of any inspector appointed by the Poor Law Board, and he shall be empowered to make any examination into the state and management of the same which he shall deem requisite, and the condition and treatment of the said children therein, and shall make his report thereon to the said Board; and the Guardians by whom any child may have been sent to any such school as aforesaid may from time to time appoint any one of their body to visit and inspect such school, and such school shall at all reasonable times be open to such visitation or inspection."

Section 5.—"The Guardians may at any time, at their discretion, and shall, upon the requisition of the Managers of the school, or upon the withdrawal of the certificate, as herein provided, cause any such child to be removed from any such school, and brought back to their parish or union."

Section 6.—"No child shall be sent to such school unless he or she be an orphan,

or deserted by his or her parents or surviving parent, or be one whose parents or surviving parent shall consent to the sending of such child to the said school."

Section 7.—"Nothing herein contained shall enable the Guardians to keep any child in any school against the will of such child, if above the age of fourteen, or of the parents or surviving parent of such child, whatever be the age of the child."

Section 8.—"The expenses incurred by the Guardians in respect of any child under this Act shall be charged to the same fund and in the same manner as the relief otherwise supplied to such child would be charged."

Section 9.—"No child shall be sent under this Act to any school which is conducted on the principles of a religious denomination to which such child does not belong."

Section 10.—"The several words used in this Act shall be construed as in the Act of the fourth and fifth years of William the Fourth, chapter seventy-six; and the word 'school' shall extend to any institution established for the instruction of blind, deaf, dumb, lame, deformed, or idiotic persons, but shall not apply to any certified Reformatory School."

Section 11.—"This Act shall not extend to Scotland or Ireland."
The Institutions certified under this Act are given on pp. 63-73.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS ACT AMENDMENT ACT, 1880, 43 & 44 VICT., CAP. 15.

Principal Clause.—"Section fourteen of the Industrial Schools Act, 1866, and section eleven of the Industrial Schools Act (Ireland), 1868, shall be respectively read and construed as if, after the four several descriptions therein respectively contained, there were added the following descriptions, namely:—

"That is lodging, living, or residing with common or reputed prostitutes, or in a house resided or frequented by prostitutes for the purpose of prostitution:

"That frequents the company of prostitutes."

MANCHESTER CORPORATION ACT, 1882, 45 & 46 VICT., CAP. 203.

Section 38.—"After the passing of this Act no child under the age of fourteen years shall, unless he has obtained a certificate of ability to read and write, and of a knowledge of elementary arithmetic, in the terms of Section 5 of the 'Elementary Education Act, 1876,' be employed in any casual employment in the city after 9 o'clock at night from the 1st day of April to the 1st day of October, and after 7 o'clock at night from the 1st day of October to the 1st day of April."

Section 39.—"Casual employment shall mean employment for purposes of gain in streets or other places in vending or exposing for sale any article whatsoever."

Section 40.—"Every person who takes a child into his employment in contravention of this Act shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings."

Section 41.—"A parent of a child who employs such child in any labour exercised by way of trade, or for the purposes of gain, or who permits such child to be engaged in any such labour on its own behalf, shall be deemed for the purposes of this Act to take the child into his employment."

Section 42.—"The provisions of this Act respecting the employment of children shall be enforced by the School Board of the city, provided that it shall be the duty of the inspectors and sub-inspectors acting under the Acts regulating factories, workshops, and mines respectively, and not of the School Board to enforce the observance by the employers of children of the provisions of this Act respecting the employment

of children in such factories, workshops, and mines, but it shall be the duty of the School Board to assist the said inspectors and sub-inspectors in the performance of their duty by information and otherwise."

IRISH ACTS.

The Acts relating to Reformatory and Industrial Schools in Ireland are the following: 21 & 22 Vict., cap. 103; 31 & 32 Vict., cap. 59; 31 Vict., cap. 25, and 44 & 45 Vict., cap. 29. This last is known as "The Reformatory Institutions (Ireland) Act, 1881," and gives power to grand juries and certain town councils to contribute towards and to borrow money for building, rebuilding, altering, enlarging, or purchasing land, for the use of a reformatory school.

It will also be observed that the "Prevention of Crimes Act, 1871" (see page 90), and "The Industrial Schools Act Amendment Act, 1880" (see page 95), apply to Ireland as well as to other parts of the United Kingdom.
