INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS, especially for Girls under the 1880 Act, are numbered:—219, 222, 225, 235, 243, 245, 250.

DESCRIPTION OF INSTITUTIONS INCLUDED IN THIS LIST.

CERTIFIED REFORMATORIES, under the Reformatory Schools Act (29 and 30 Vict., cap. 117), are for the reception, under sentence by a magistrate, of criminal children under sixteen years of age.

CERTIFIED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS, under the Industrial Schools Act (29 and 30 Vict., cap. 118), are for the reception, under the order of a magistrate, of any child

under fourteen, coming within any of the following descriptions, viz. :-

Section 14. That is found begging or receiving alms (whether actually or under the pretext of selling or offering for sale anything), or being in any street or public place for the purpose of so begging or receiving alms.

That is found wandering, and not having any home or settled place of abode or proper guardianship or visible means of subsistence.

That is found destitute, either being an orphan or having a surviving parent who is undergoing penal servitude or imprisonment.

That frequents the company of reputed thieves.

That is living with common or reputed prostitutes (43 and 44 Vict., cap. 15).

Section 17. That, being maintained in a Workhouse or Pauper School, is refractory.

Section 15. Also children under twelve, charged with an offence punishable by imprisonment, or a less punishment, but not previously convicted of felony.

Section 16. Such, that his parent, step-parent, or guardian, represents that he is unable to control the child, and desires him to be sent to an Industrial School, under the Act.

See also "The Prevention of Crimes Act, 1871" (34 and 35 Vict., cap. 112, sec. 14) and "Elementary Education Acts" (39 and 40 Vict., cap. 79, sec. 11—15).

TRUANT CERTIFIED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS are for the reception, under a magis-

trate's order, of truant children only.

DAY INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS receive children only during the day-time—there are no dormitories for the children.

INSTITUTIONS CERTIFIED UNDER THE "EDUCATION OF PAUPER CHILDREN ACT" (25 and 26 Vict., cap. 43) are for the reception of poor children and other persons, for a portion of the cost of whose maintenance the Guardians of a parish make themselves responsible.

VOLUNTARY HOMES, REFUGES, AND UNCERTIFIED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS, are for the reception of the homeless, neglected, and destitute, either by payment of friends, or

HOMES FOR WORKING BOYS are for boys in situations without homes, and they

contribute to their own support according to their earnings.

THE TRAINING SHIPS in connection with the Union are of various kinds,some are Certified Reformatories, some Certified Industrial Schools, and others are Voluntary Refuges. They are for boys physically and otherwise suited for a sea life.

MAGDALEN INSTITUTIONS receive penitent fallen women.

DISCHARGED PRISONERS' AID SOCIETIES assist prisoners on their discharge from

prison.

HOMES FOR INEBRIATES are for the reception of habitual drunkards, male or female, under the Habitual Drunkards Act or otherwise.

This CLASSIFIED LIST contains all the Certified Institutions that are under the inspection of the Home Office or the Local Government Board.

Only Protestant Uncertified Institutions are placed on this List, and in so doing the Council are guided by the following Resolution, adopted April 7, 1859 :-

"That no Uncertified Institution, supported by or seeking public contributions, be for the future placed on the list of the Union, which has not a Committee responsible in itself, and ready to guarantee the bona fide character of the Institution."

The Council of the Reformatory and Refuge Union is not responsible for the management of affiliated Institutions. For advantages of affiliation see next page.

The advantages of Institutions being affiliated

TO THE

REFORMATORY & REFUGE UNION & CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY.

In dealing with neglected and destitute children, in seeking to save children from evil surroundings (whether arising from parental neglect or other evil associations), and in trying to arrest the evil course of elder children who, hardly through any fault of their own, have been brought, for the first time, within the power of the Law, a network of Institutions has been established in our country, each under an independent management, and each seeking to benefit some particular section of these children. The Managers of these Child-Saving Institutions have certain interests and objects in common; they have certain work to perform in which the co-operation of the Managers of kindred Institutions is likely to be advantageous; and they have requirements which a central London Office and Agency can help them to attain. Recognizing this, a large number of the Managers of all classes of Child-Saving Homes in the Kingdom have affiliated them to the Children's Aid Society, or the Reformatory and Refuge Union, and their titles are entered in the Classified List.

This act of affiliation involves no responsibility, but the entry in the List is a measure of guarantee of respectability and genuineness; for no Home is entered on the List

except it is either:-

(a) under Government Inspection; or,

(b) under the management of a responsible Committee, and ready to guarantee the bond fide character of the Institution; and

(c) is open to visitation by a representative of the Central Council.

No affiliation subscription is demanded for many of the advantages which the Union offers, but it is hoped that, where possible, a subscription will be sent. Two shillings a year entitles the affiliated Institution to receive monthly a copy of the Reformatory and Refuge Journal. A guinea a year entitles the affiliated Institution to nominate a Representative Member on the Central Council.

It is difficult to describe fully all the advantages of affiliation, but the following

may be mentioned:-

1. Quarterly Meetings of Managers in the Metropolis, and Annual Meetings in other parts of England, to discuss matters of general or specific interest bearing upon the work. To these gatherings affiliated Institutions are invited to send representatives.

2.- Triennial Conferences of Managers lasting over three or four days, at which subjects are discussed, a programme being previously carefully prepared and circulated. At these Conferences many of the Institutions of the district are visited, and hospitality is provided as far as practicable. They have been held in London, Edinburgh, Bristol, Dublin, Liverpool, Glasgow, Exeter, Plymouth and Newcastle. Much benefit has been derived from these gatherings by the Managers and Officers who have attended them.

3.- Special Meetings are held as occasion may require to promote legislation in favour of the common objects of the Managers of affiliated Homes; or to organise opposition to measures that are likely to be prejudicial to the aims of the Managers.

4. - A Central Office is provided in London to which letters can be addressed, and at which, by previous arrangement, appointments can be made. Books of reference are also provided here, such as, Parliamentary Reports, copies of Acts of Parliament, Directories, the Time Tables of all the Railway Companies, etc., etc.

5.—A Register is kept at the Central Office of persons desiring to be engaged as Superintendents, Masters, Matrons, Assistant Masters, Assistant Matrons, etc.

6.—Agents are employed by the Council who will, upon sufficient notice being given, meet, at the Railway Stations, cases being sent to or from the Homes in the country through or to London. Officers of the Children's Aid Society also "look after" the Waifs and Strays wandering in the thoroughfares of the metropolis, or otherwise needing help. They rescue children from the haunts of vice and misery, taking the necessary steps for placing them in Certified Reformatories, Industrial Schools, or other Homes, according as the circumstances require. The Police Courts are attended and Managers of the Homes and Schools are assisted by careful investigation concerning applicants for admission to the various Institutions. There is also a Boys' Emigration Agency in Manitoba (see page 82). Enquiries of various kinds are made for the

7.—A Provident and Benevolent Fund is established to assist the Superintendents and Officers of Institutions in times of illness, or unexpected distress, and a special fund is in operation for providing old age pensions. The membership is confined to the Officers of affiliated Institutions. The rules and conditions of membership will be found in the Annual Report of the Provident and Benevolent Fund, which will be forwarded upon application to the Secretary, 32, Charing Cross, S.W.

affiliated Institutions, and the Central Agency is found useful in many other ways.

8.—Difficulties experienced in the work, or topics relating to it, will be considered by the Council and, if desired, they will be discussed at the Ouarterly Meetings, or in the pages of the Reformatory and Refuge Journal, after having been brought under the notice of the Central Council by the Managers or Officers of affiliated Institutions.

9.—Small Grants are occasionally made to affiliated Institutions to assist them to secure the freehold of their premises and thus place the Homes upon a more permanent footing.

The Council of the Union is always glad to render every possible service to the affiliated Institutions. What has been mentioned above in reference to Child-Saving Institutions applies with equal force to every class of Preventive and Reformatory Homes; for, although the work of a Child-Saving Home is perfectly distinct from that of a Reformatory or Penitentiary, the border line between prevention and reformation is often a very fine one. Whether a child is sent to a Voluntary Home, or to an Industrial School, or to a Reformatory, depends sometimes upon the ability of friends to make a certain payment, or upon the age of the child within a day. Again, in aiding illegitimate children, it is often essential at the same time to offer a helping hand to the mother by providing a Home for her. So that, the Institutions included in this List comprise a thorough system of child-saving, prevention and reformation. The special wants of each class of affiliated Home receive the careful consideration of the Council. A special Committee takes in hand the requirements of Discharged Prisoners' Aid Societies. Another Special Committee deals with Penitentiary work, and separate special Conferences are held for the Managers of both these classes of Institutions, while for the help of Managers of the latter class, a quarterly publication is issued.

The Union co-operates heartily with the Metropolitan Police Magistrates; also with School Boards and other Educational Institutions, by supplementing their work in cases which they are unable to deal with.

The chief aim of the Union is to reclaim and elevate the neglected and criminal classes by educating them in the fear of God and in the knowledge of the Holy Scriptures.

GENERAL NOTE.

When it is desired to assist cases of destitute or neglected children, or youths of either sex placed in dangerous circumstances, it will often save much trouble and delay if application for advice be made to the Secretary of the Reformatory and Refuge Union (32, Charing Cross. London, S.W.), who will at once forward a form on which to furnish the necessary particulars of the case. He will then communicate what course it seems most desirable to pursue under the particular circumstances, and, if a Home is required, which would be the most suitable.

The Church Army Social System

consists principally of Labour Homes for Men, Women and Youths (each limited to 25 inmates) in the poorest parishes in England, where selected cases of the apparently hopeless are received and trained to habits of industry, total abstinence and godliness. Each immate has freely to use the bath, and is provided with a bed and clean sheets. If he will not work for his board, washing and lodging, he is discharged. After two or three mouths' genuine test they are assisted to find situations at home or in farm life, or are sent abroad under the guidance of Colonial Clergymen.

In carrying out the above industries steam power is used in many of the Institutions, and the inmates are in these cases taught the care and management of the engines and machinery. The ordinary daily domestic work of the Home is in all cases done by the immates, and is not included in the above list of industries.

No payments are made for children under six, nor for children committed under Section xvii. For these latter the Boards of Guardians are responsible.

The Treasury payment is reduced to 3s. per week in the case of children under Sections xiv. and xv. who have been four years in the School and are fifteen years of age.

For inmates who work outside full time (Sections xiv. and xv. Industrial Schools Act, and Section xi. (2) E. E. A.) the Treasury payment is reduced to 2s. 6d.

In IRELAND the Government Grant for each child committed to an Industrial School is £13 a year; and the average rate paid by the Counties is about £4 to £5.

HABITUAL DRUNKARDS ACT, 1879.

An Act to facilitate the control and cure of Habitual Drunkards. 42 & 43 VICT., CAP. 19.

[3rd July, 1879.]

THEREAS it is desirable to facilitate the control and cure of Habitual

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by authority of the same, as follows:-

Preliminary.

1. This Act may be cited as the Habitual Drunkards Act, 1879.

2. This Act shall commence and come into operation on the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and shall be in force until the expiration of ten® years from the passing thereof, and to the end of the then next Session of Parliament.

3. In this Act-

The expression "Secretary of State" means one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

The expression "summary conviction" means conviction before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction.

The expression "Summary Jurisdiction Acts" means-

(1.) As regards England, the Act of the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of the reign of Her present Majesty. Chapter 43, intituled "An Act to facilitate the performance of the duties of Justices of the Peace out of Sessions within England and Wales with respect to summary convictions and orders," and any Act amending the same; and

As regards Scotland, the Summary Procedure Act, 1864; and

As regards Ireland, with reference to any matter or proceeding in the police district of Dublin metropolis, the Acts regulating the powers and duties of Justices of the Peace for or the police of such district, and with reference to any matter or proceeding elsewhere in Ireland, the Petty Sessions (Ireland) Act, 1851, and the Acts amending the same.

The expression "Court of Summary Jurisdiction" means -

(a) As regards England and Ireland, any Justice or Justices of the Peace to whom jurisdiction is given by the Summary Jurisdiction Acts; provided that the Court when hearing and determining an information or complaint under this Act shall be constituted either of two or more Justices of the Peace in Petty Sessions sitting at some place appointed for holding Petty Sessions, or of some Magistrate or Officer sitting alone or with others at some Court or other place appointed for the administration of justice, and for the time being empowered by law to do alone any act authorised to be done by more than one Justice; and

(b) As regards Scotland, the Sheriff or his substitute.

"Justice" means a Justice or Justices of the Peace, metropolitan Police Magistrate, Stipendiary or other Magistrate by whatever name called. having jurisdiction under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts in the place where the matter requiring the cognizance of a Justice arises.

"A Retreat" means a house licensed by the licensing authority named by this Act, for the reception, control, care and curative treatment of habitual drunkards. "Habitual drunkard" means a person who, not being amenable to any jurisdiction

* For extension, see 51 and 52 Vict., c. 19.

in lunacy, is notwithstanding, by reason of habitual intemperate drinking of intoxicating liquor, at times dangerous to himself or herself or to others, or incapable of managing himself or herself, and his or her affairs.

4. The Schedules to this Act, with the notes and directions therein, shall have effect as part of this Act; and the Rules contained in those Schedules and the Forms therein given, or Forms to the like effect, shall be observed, with such variations as circumstances require, by the persons, for the purposes, and in the manner therein indicated; but no instrument made in execution or intended execution of this Act shall be invalidated for defect in Form only.

5. The several bodies and Officers mentioned in the second and third columns respectively of the First Schedule of this Act shall be the local authority and clerk of the local authority respectively under this Act, in reference to the several corresponding

districts mentioned in the first column of the said Schedule.

Establishment of Retreats.

6. The local authority may, subject to any conditions which such local authority shall deem fit, grant to any person, or to two or more persons jointly, a license for any period not exceeding thirteen months to keep a Retreat; and may, from time to time, revoke or renew such license. The application for such license shall be in the Form No. 1 in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect. The license shall be in the Form No. 2 in the same Schedule, or to the like effect. One at least of the persons to whom a license is granted shall reside in the Retreat, and be responsible for its management. A duly qualified medical man shall be employed as medical attendant of such Retreat, provided that when the name of the licensee shall be on the Medical Register he may himself act as such medical attendant.

7. No license shall be given to any person who is licensed to keep a house for the

8. If the licensee of any Retreat becomes incapable, from sickness or otherwise, of keeping such Retreat, dies, or becomes bankrupt, or has his affairs liquidated by arrangement, or becomes mentally incapable or otherwise disabled, the local authority, by writing under their hands, indorsed on the license, may transfer the license to another person, if the local authority, in its discretion, shall think fit.

9. If any Retreat becomes unfit for the habitation of the persons detained therein under this Act, or otherwise unsuitable for its purpose, the local authority or the Inspector of Retreats appointed under this Act shall order their discharge from such Retreat on a day to be mentioned in the order. Such order shall be signed

by the clerk of the local authority or by the Inspector, as the case may be.

The licensee of the Retreat from which such persons or person are to be so removed shall with all practicable speed, send by post a copy of such order to the person by whom the last payment for each person so to be removed from the Retreat was made, or one at least of the persons who signed the statutory declaration under Section 10 of this Act.

10. Any habitual drunkard desirous of being admitted into a Retreat may make application in writing to the licensee of a Retreat for admission into such Retreat, and such application shall be in the Form No. 3 in the Second Schedule hereto, and shall state the time during which such applicant undertakes to remain in such Retreat. Such application shall be accompanied by the statutory declaration of two persons to the effect that the applicant is an habitual drunkard within the meaning of

The signature of the applicant to such application shall be attested by two Justices of the Peace, and such Justices shall not attest the signature unless they have satisfied themselves that the applicant is an habitual drunkard within the meaning of this Act, and have explained to him the effect of his application for admission into a Retreat, and his reception therein, and such Justices shall state in writing, and as a part of such attestation, that the applicant understood the effect of his application for admission and his reception into the Retreat.

Such applicant, after his admission and reception into such Retreat, unless dis-

charged or authorised by license as hereinafter provided, shall not be entitled to leave such Retreat till the expiration of the term mentioned in his application, and such applicant may be detained therein till the expiration of such term; provided that such term shall not exceed the period of twelve calendar months.

11. Every licensee of a Retreat under this Act shall, within two clear days after the reception of any person received therein under this Act, send a copy of the application of such person for admission under which such person is so received by any such licensee, to the clerk of the local authority and to the Secretary of State.

12. Any person admitted into any Retreat under this Act may, at any time thereafter, be discharged by the order of a Justice, upon the request in writing of the licensee of the Retreat, if it shall appear to such Justice to be reasonable and proper.

Inspection of Retreats.

13. The Secretary of State may from time to time appoint such person as he shall think fit, who may hold office during his pleasure, and shall be styled "the Inspector of Retreats."

The Secretary of State may also, if it appears to him and to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury necessary for the due execution of this Act, from time to time appoint a fit person as "Assistant Inspector of Retreats," who shall also hold office during his pleasure, and every person so appointed shall have such of the powers and duties of Inspector of Retreats as the Secretary of State may from time to time prescribe.

The Secretary of State may assign to the Inspector of Retreats and Assistant Inspector of Retreats such salaries or remuneration and allowances as he may, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, think proper; the said salaries, remuneration, and allowances, and the expenses of the Inspectors of Retreats, and Assistant Inspectors of Retreats, in carrying out the provisions of this Act, to such amount as is allowed by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall be paid out of moneys provided by Parliament in that behalf.

14. Every license granted in pursuance of this Act shall be subject to a duty, and be impressed with a stamp of five pounds, and ten shillings for every patient above ten whom it is intended to admit into the Retreat, and every renewal of a license shall be impressed with a stamp of the same amount. The said sums shall be deemed to be stamp duties and be under the management of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue; and all enactments for the time being in force relating to stamp duties and to dies, plates, and other implements provided for the purpose of stamp duties, including all enactments relating to forgery and frauds relating to stamp duties, shall apply accordingly. All expense incurred by the local authority in connection with any application for the granting, renewing, or transferring of such license shall be borne by the applicant, together with the stamp and fee for the license; and all fees for licenses and for searches, if any, under this Act, shall be paid over to the clerk for the local authority.

15. Every Retreat shall, from time to time, and at least twice in each year, be inspected by the Inspector or Assistant Inspector of Retreats. The Secretary of State may at any time, on the recommendation of the Inspector or Assistant Inspector of Retreats, or in his own discretion, order the discharge of any person detained in any Retreat.

16. The Inspector of Retreats shall, in the month of January in each year, present to the Secretary of State a general Report setting forth the situation of each Retreat, the names of the licensees, and the number of habitual drunkards who have been admitted and discharged, or who have died during the past year, with such observations as he shall think fit as to the results of treatment and the condition of the Retreats. The Secretary of State shall lay such Report, together with the rules, before Parliament.

17. The Secretary of State may from time to time make rules for the management of a Retreat, and may from time to time cancel or alter such rules.

Any person who contravenes or fails to comply with any of such rules for the management of a Retreat shall be deemed to be guilty of an offence against this Act.

A printed copy of rules purporting to be the rules of a Retreat, signed by the Inspector or Assistant Inspector of Retreats, shall be evidence of such rules of the Retreat.

18. A Judge of the High Court of Justice, on an application ex parte at chambers, or a County Court Judge, within whose district the Retreat is situated, may at any time, by order under his hand, authorize and direct any person or persons to visit and examine a person detained in a Retreat under this Act, and to inquire into and report on any matters which such Judge may think fit in relation to the person so detained. The Judge, on receiving such report, may, if he shall think fit, order the discharge of any person so detained from any such Retreat.

Leave of Absence from Retreat.

19. A Justice of the Peace, at the request of a licensee of a Retreat, may, at any time after the admission into a Retreat of an habitual drunkard, by license under his hand permit such habitual drunkard to live with any trustworthy and respectable person named in the license willing to receive and take charge of him for a definite time for the benefit of his health

Such a license shall not be in force for more than two months, but may at any time before the expiration of that period, be renewed for a further period not exceeding two months, and so from time to time until the habitual drunkard's period of detention has expired.

20. The time during which an habitual drunkard is absent from a Retreat under such a license shall, except where the license is forfeited or revoked as hereinafter provided, be deemed to be part of the time of his detention in such Retreat. Where such license is forfeited or revoked, the time during which such habitual drunkard was so absent from the Retreat shall be excluded in computing the time during which he may be detained in the Retreat.

21. An habitual drunkard absent from a Retreat under such a license, who escapes from the person in whose charge he is placed as aforesaid, or who refuses to be restrained from drinking intoxicating liquors, shall be considered *ipso facto* to have forfeited the license, and may be taken back to the Retreat as hereinafter provided. An unauthorized absence from a Retreat of a person ordered to be detained therein shall not be excluded in computing the time during which he may be detained.

22. Any such license may be revoked at any time by the Secretary of State on the recommendation of the Inspector or Assistant Inspector of Retreats, or by the Justice of the Peace by whom such license may have been granted, by writing under his hand, and thereupon the habitual drunkard to whom the license related shall return to the Retreat.

Offences.

- **23.** If any licensee of any Retreat knowingly and wilfully fails to comply with the provisions of this Act, or neglects or permits to be neglected any habitual drunkard placed in the Retreat in respect of which he is licensed, or does anything in contravention of the provisions of this Act, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Act.
 - 24. If any person does any of the following things—
 - (1.) Ill-treats, or, being an officer, servant, or other person employed in or about a Retreat, wilfully neglects, any habitual drunkard detained in a Retreat;
 - (2.) Induces or knowingly assists an habitual drunkard detained in a Retreat to escape therefrom;
 - (3) Without the authority of the licensee or the medical officer of the Retreat (proof whereof shall lie on him) brings in to any Retreat, or, without the authority of the medical officer of the Retreat, except in case of urgent

necessity, gives or supplies to any person detained therein, any intoxicating liquor, or sedative narcotic, or stimulant drug or preparation,

he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Act.

25. If an habitual drunkard, while detained in a Retreat, wilfully neglects or wilfully refuses to conform to the rules thereof, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be liable upon summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, or, at the discretion of the Court, to be imprisoned for any period not exceeding seven days, and at the expiration of his imprisonment (if any) for such offence he shall be brought back to such Retreat, there to be detained for curative treatment until the expiration of his prescribed period of detention in the Retreat, and in reckoning such period the time during which such person was in Prison shall be excluded from

26. If an habitual drunkard escapes from a Retreat, or from the person in whose charge he has been placed under license as hereinbefore mentioned, it shall be lawful for any Justice or Magistrate having jurisdiction in the place or district where he is found, or in the place or district where the Retreat from which he escaped is situate, upon the sworn information of the licensee of such Retreat, to issue a warrant for the apprehension of such habitual drunkard at any time before the expiration of his prescribed period of detention; and such habitual drunkard shall, after apprehension, be brought before a Justice or Magistrate, and may, if such Justice or Magistrate should so order,

be remitted to the Retreat from which he had so escaped.

27. In case of the death of any person detained in any Retreat, a statement of the cause of the death of such person, with the name of any person present at the death, shall be drawn up and signed by the principal medical attendant of such Retreat, and copies thereof, duly certified in writing by the licensee of such Retreat, shall be by him transmitted to the Coroner and to the Registrar of Deaths for the district, and to the clerk of the local authority, and to the person by whom the last payment was made for the deceased, or one at least of the persons who signed the statutory declaration under Section 10 of this Act.

Every medical attendant who shall neglect or omit to draw up and sign such statement as aforesaid, and every licensee of a Retreat who shall neglect or omit to certify and transmit such statement as aforesaid, shall be deemed guilty of an offence

against this Act.

28. Any person, not being an habitual drunkard detained in a Retreat, who is guilty of an offence against this Act, to which no other penalty is affixed, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, or, at the discretion of the Court, to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding three months with or without

29. The Summary Jurisdiction Acts shall apply to all offences in respect of which jurisdiction is given to any Court of Summary Jurisdiction by this Act, or which are directed to be prosecuted, enforced, or made before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction, or in a summary manner, or upon summary conviction.

30. In England, if any person thinks himself aggrieved by any conviction or order of a Court of Summary Jurisdiction, he may appeal therefrom, subject to the

conditions and regulations following:-

(1.) The appeal shall be made to the next Court of General or Quarter Sessions for the county, borough, or place in which the cause of appeal has arisen, held not less than fifteen days and (unless adjourned by the Court) not more than four months after the conviction or order appealed from:

(2.) The appellant shall, within seven days after the cause of appeal has arisen, give notice to the other party and to the clerk of the Court of Summary Jurisdiction appealed from of his intention to appeal, and of the ground

thereof.

(3.) The appellant shall, within three days after such notice, enter into a recognizance before a Justice with two sufficient sureties conditioned personally to try the appeal, and to abide the judgment of the appellate Court thereon

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and to pay such costs as may be awarded by the Court, or give such other security, by deposit of money or otherwise, as the Justice allows:

(4.) Where the appellant is in custody any Justice having jurisdiction in such complaint may, if he thinks fit, on the appellant entering into such recognizance or giving such other security as to such Justice shall seem sufficient,

release him from custody:

(5.) The appellate Court may adjourn the appeal; and, on the hearing thereof, they may confirm, reverse, or modify the decision of the Court of Summary Jurisdiction appealed from, or remit the matter, with the opinion of the appellate Court thereon, to the Court of Summary Jurisdiction, or make such other order in the matter as the Court thinks just, and if the matter be remitted to the Court of Summary Jurisdiction, the said lastmentioned Court shall thereupon re-hear and decide the matter in accordance with the order of the said Court of Appeal. The Court of Appeal may also make such order as to costs to be paid by either party as the Court thinks just.

31. Any action against any person for anything done in pursuance or execution or intended execution of this Act shall be commenced within two years after the thing

done, and not otherwise.

Notice in writing of every such action and of the cause thereof shall be given to the intended defendant one month at least before the commencement of the action.

Miscellaneous.

32. The time during which a person is detained in a Retreat shall for all purposes be excluded in the computation of time mentioned in Section 1 of the Act of the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, Chapter 66, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the removal of the poor," as amended by any other

33. Persons who hold their estates, being other than ecclesiastical benefices, subject to any condition of residence shall not incur any forfeiture through being

detained in any Retreat.

34. The Secretary of State may, subject as herein mentioned, prescribe the fees to be paid in carrying out the provisions of this Act.

Scotland.

35. In the application of this Act to Scotland the following provisions shall have effect :--

(1.) The term "Sheriff" includes Sheriff substitute:

(2.) All penalties for offences under this Act shall be recovered, with expenses, in a summary manner before the Sheriff at the instance of the Procurator fiscal

- (3.) An appeal against a conviction or order of a Court of Summary Jurisdiction under this Act shall be to the Court of Justiciary at the next Circuit Court, or, where there are no Circuit Courts, to the High Court of Justiciary at Edinburgh, and not otherwise; and such appeal may be made in the manner and under the rules, limitations, and conditions contained in the Act of the twentieth year of the reign of King George the Second, Chapter 43, "for taking away and abolishing heritable jurisdictions in Scotland," or as near thereto as circumstances admit; with this variation, that the appellant shall find caution to pay the fine and expenses awarded against him by the conviction or order appealed from, together with any additional expenses awarded by the Court dismissing the appeal:
- The jurisdiction and authority conferred on a County Court Judge under this Act in England may in Scotland be exercised by a Sheriff.

Ireland.

36. In the application of this Act to Ireland the following provisions shall take effect :-

(1.) An appeal against a conviction or order of a Court of Summary Jurisdiction shall, within the police district of Dublin metropolis, be made in manner prescribed or allowed by the Acts regulating the powers and duties of Justices of the Peace for such district, and as regards other places in Ireland in accordance with the provisions of the Petty Sessions (Ireland) Act, 1851, and any Act or Acts affecting or amending the same, or as nearly in accordance with their several Acts in each case as the circumstances will permit:

(2.) All fees for licenses and searches, and other fees, if any, under this Act, shall be paid over to the clerk of the local authority, and in every case in which such clerk is a clerk of the peace, or temporary clerk of the peace, shall be receivable by him for his own use, but in every case in which such clerk is a clerk of the Crown and peace, shall be accounted for by him in the same way as fees payable to him under the provisions of the County Officers and Courts (Ireland) Act, 1877.

An Act to Amend the Habitual Drunkards Act, 1879.

51 & 52 VICT., CAP. 19.

[24th July, 1888.]

W HEREAS the Habitual Drunkards Act, 1879, is limited to expire at the termination of ten years from the precinc the of Parliament; and whereas it is expedient to provide for the continuance of the said Act, and for the amendment of the same:

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:-

1. This Act may be cited for all purposes as the Inchriates Act, 1888.

2. So much of the second section of the Habitual Drunkards Act, 1879, as provides that the said Act shall be in force until the termination of ten years from the passing thereof and to the end of the then next Session of Parliament, is hereby repealed; and be it enacted in lieu thereof that the aforesaid Act as amended by this Act shall be and remain in force until otherwise provided by Parliament.

3. Subject to the approval of the local authority granting a license for a Retreat, the licensee of any Retreat may from time to time appoint a deputy to act for him during his temporary absence, and such deputy shall during the absence of the licensee have and exercise all powers, and be subject to all the duties, disabilities, prohibitions, and penalties imposed upon the licensee of such Retreat under the provisions of the Habitual Drunkards Act, 1879. Provided always that the appointment of such deputy shall not entitle him to act for such licensee during any period or periods exceeding in all six weeks in any one year.

4. So much of Section 3 and of Section 10 of the Habitual Drunkards Act, 1879, as provides that the signature of an habitual drunkard applying to be admitted to a Retreat shall be attested by two Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction under the Summary Jurisdiction Act, in the place where the matter requiring the cognisance of a Justice arises, is hereby repealed, and such attestation may be that of any two

Justices of the Peace.

5. The Habitual Drunkards Act, 1879, and this Act shall be read and construed together as one Act, and may be cited together as the Inebriates Act, 1879 and 1888.

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
